Ministry Expands with Limitations

It's all good!

When I was diagnosed with a new cancer in May, a familiar verse immediately came to mind. "We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to His purpose" (Rom. 8:28). The word *all* does not mean *some*, *most* or *many* things work for good. God impressed on me, "Is there anything you don't understand about the word *all*?" It is a work in progress, so my theme in this cancer journey is, "It's all good!"



My Prayer



I had one primary prayer request, "Lord, may I share my faith with each doctor and nurse we meet with." It happened and so naturally as they routinely asked if I was retired. When I said I was still working, they asked what I did. Wow, what an open door! I told them I help

people know how to have a personal relationship with God and have a better quality of life, and it is not about church or religion; it's a *relationship*. I thanked each one for their years of education and sacrifice of time, energy, and money and affirmed how important they are. Because people highly respect and trust them, they have an open door to speak into their lives

with hope. I encouraged them to consider having a brief prayer with each patient. One doctor even asked me to pray right there for him. Each medical person listened and thanked us for sharing. "It's all good!"

Worth the Wait

While in the waiting room, I sat next to an older man playing poker on his phone. I casually asked if he was playing against himself. That developed into a conversation about his military background and how



as a retired veteran he likes to help other vets. It was a natural opening to share how we train people to help others. What's most important is a personal relationship with Jesus. I prayed with him and he

gratefully reached over and gave me a big hug. Waiting brought an opportunity to share and "It's all good!"

The New Walk

Surgery on my right calf on July 9 removed the sarcoma cancer tumor (4" x 3" by 2"). The doc said the swelling from my knee to toes could take three to six months to heal. A walker became my new best friend as I *s l o w l y*

began to walk, determined to push through the pain. The distance increased from half a mile, to a mile, to two miles. Three weeks after surgery I was able to



retire the walker and graduate to a cane. I'm so deeply grateful for God's grace and the scores of prayers by many of you. "It's all good!"

Cancer Uncertainty

The lab report revealed microscopic cancer cells in the margins around the tumor. So, the next step is radiation for sixteen days from the knee down. This myxofibro sarcoma cancer is very rare (1 in a 1,000) and its normal place to travel is the lungs. So far it has not gone there. Our limitations are God's opportunity to show Himself strong and no matter what the future holds, "It's all good!"



Back to work

One week after surgery, I headed back to the office with my trusty walker. Discomfort and pain are only walls to crash through or crawl over. In spite of limited strength, I am able to meet with people, do the administrative work, and conduct international Zoom counseling and group trainings. It is made possible by the strength God is giving and the encouragement from caring family and friends. "It's all good!"



Zooms Beyond Expectation

We had to reschedule the trainings in Puerto Rico for July and Peru for September, but Lord willing, we will be able to travel to Greece in October and Mexico in November. Meanwhile, our travel is through Zoom trainings. Our skilled translator, Raquel, coordinates and translates our Zooms in Spanish speaking countries. People know what we are going through and are very grateful that we would continue to mentor them in how to help others to work through difficult situations biblically. Recently, a Zoom was hosted in Venezuela and 35 people also signed in

from Argentina, Colombia, Mexico, and Spain. There were pastors, leaders, lay people, and psychologists. Their response? "When is the next one!"

A pastor's wife from Venezuela even watched the Zoom from her hospital bed in Houston. She shared with us afterward how the session, Ending the Control of Negative Emotions, helped her personally. Doing these Zooms are challenging and take a special effort but, "It's all good!"



What Care!

No dad deserves the amazing tender care he has received from our two daughters during and after the surgery. Then "nurse" Linda has taken over and helped with physical therapy at home. Friends have brought meals and helped in practical ways. The calls, prayers, and emails from around the world have been overwhelming. It is so undeserved but deeply appreciated and this, too, "is all good."



We wish we could thank each of you in person for your love and prayers on our behalf. The physical therapist commented that he appreciated our positive attitude. Little did he know the many prayers and acts of kindness showered on us that give us the strength to press on and affirm, "It's all good!"
